It was an unforgettable journey, in which two old friends - **Frank Grunwald** and **Hellmuth Szprycer** reunited once again after 65 years!



Hellmuth Szprycer was only 13 years-old when he whistled with the 'Swingers' Jazz band in ghetto Terezin to save the lives of his grandparents. Frank Grunwald was only 10 years-old when he and his older brother John sang popular Jazz songs for just a few moments of mental escape. Fate joined the two boys in the barracks of Auschwitz Birkenau family camp.

After the Auschwitz concentration camp liberation in 1945, Frank and Hellmuth's ways departed and they each continued on with their lives. In this unforgettable journey filled with tears and laughter, we witnessed the reunion of two old friends. Addy explains:

It never fails to amaze me how Holocaust survivors managed to keep their hope and their faith under the most unbearable situation. They never gave up, and out of these horrific events we have their heroic stories of survival. I find it easier to understand why people who "played for their lives" had the will to survive. Music got them through the hard times. At times of complete despair, music was there as an outlet, a place where they could just loose themselves in the melody and the rhythm of the song. It meant so much to me to hear the survivors on the trailer talk about music. I could just tell by their expressions how important music was to them and how much they cherished it. Music is something I cherish listening to and playing. When I am upset or stressed, I sit down and I play. Music is such an important part of my generations' life. While not all musicians, most of us listen to music, whatever kind it might be. Like many my age, when I feel mad or upset, I listen to my favorite song to escape from reality, just as some survivors did. The difference is that no one's tales of misery today could ever compare to the horrific stories that these survivors have to tell. Music is the bridge between my generation and the survivors. It's a way for our generation to hear their stories of survival, and it's a way for us to connect their stories to our lives. This film will insure that my generation and the future generations will also never forget. Addy is self-motivated and strong-willed with a wonderful gift for music and writing. She

has been dedicating her time to raise awareness of the film among her community and friends by writing articles and blogs for the local community newspapers. Addy, who recently celebrated her Bat-Mitzvah made an admirable decision to donate a portion of her gifts to the completion of the film. We are honored to have Addy on our team!
